Regina Clark is on the board of the McGroarty Arts Center and is the Programs Director for the Little Landers Historical Society, both in Tujunga. She will talk about the life of John & Ida McGroarty Starting with John McGroarty's humble beginnings in Foster Township, Pennsylvania to the hustle and bustle of Los Angeles, His life was interesting and somewhat unusual. He was a teacher, journalist, editor, Justice of the Peace, County Treasurer, attorney, author, California's Poet Laureate and a US Congressman. Many powerful men knew him and liked him. And Ida.... She was the woman behind the man. Quiet and logical, she kept him grounded.

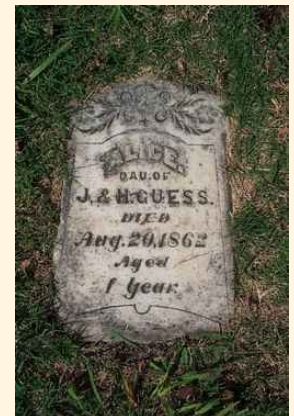
Work is underway at La Laguna Playground!

Thanks to funding from the Annenberg Foundation, California Cultural and Historic Endowment, Pasadena City College Foundation, the National Trust for Historic Preservation, and in partnership with the City of San Gabriel, work has begun at Dinosaur Park – La Laguna Playground. The grant monies funded construction documents for the entire playground and the rehabilitation of the wooden dock and the central "Lookout Mountain" dragon slide. The wooden dock had deteriorated to a dangerous point and students from the Pasadena City College Industrial Arts program donated hundreds of hours dismantling and restoring the dock. It is wonderful to see it with the four staircases functional once again! California Waterproofing and Restoration has done an amazing job stabilizing the foundation of Lookout Mountain and repairing the cracked concrete on the rock surface. Their work will continue through the fall as they work to further stabilize the slide structure and to restore the original colors. While the playground is still an active construction site, we are looking forward to the day when the community can enjoy the playground again. Children of the Savannah

"Little Charlie," Baby Turner, and Alice are just three of over seven hundred children buried in Savannah Memorial Park - A Pioneer Cemetery, since the 1850s. Baby Turner died at birth after his mother was shot during an 1874 robbery at the family's general store on La Puente Creek. Unlike the beautiful headstone for one-year-old Alice Guess, the Turner baby is one of many laid to rest in unmarked graves in, what was then known as, El Monte Cemetery. Brace Gibson lost both his nineteen-year-old wife, Luty Velmar, and his four-month-old child, Luty Etta, in 1888. Children ranging in age from stillborn to their teens died from accident, or diseases and epidemics of the time - pneumonia, typhoid fever, smallpox, influenza, or measles. Luty Velmar Gibson died of consumption (known today as tuberculosis).

A descendent of San Gabriel Valley pioneers, Jerry Lynne Treinen, is currently researching documentation for a story about the Children of the Savannah. If you have any knowledge surrounding either the life or death of one of these children, she would be interested in hearing from you. Whether from events told by word of mouth, or information written in a family bible or journal, what you know of family history is important. Please contact her via the addresses below.



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
